FUNDS TO BE RAISED TO REPLACE BELLAMY HOUSE ROOF
BOOK SALE PLANNED

Join us on Saturday, June 29 for our first fundraiser! From 10:00 to 2:30, we will be hosting a book sale featuring a wide variety of fiction and nonfiction, both old and newer. Our first floor exhibits will also be open to the public, including a new display on Edward Bellamy's family tree. Visitors will have an opportunity to view the Bellamy parlors and some photos by Daniel Hanifan, as well as learn more about Edward Bellamy and our future plans for the house.

Proceeds from the sale will go toward the much-needed replacement of the roof. Leaks have developed in both the cedar roof over the main house and the asphalt shingles on one of the ells; the ceiling underneath has been damaged in both locations. A new roof will allow us to protect our collections, as well as turn additional rooms on the first and second floors into exhibit space.



## Did you know...

....that there are two published versions of *The Duke of Stockbridge*? Originally published as a serial in the *Berkshire Courier* in 1879, Bellamy wrote this story of Shays's Rebellion as an allegory for contemporary economic issues. (Shays's Rebellion was a series of protests and armed conflicts that occurred in Massachusetts from fall of 1786 through February of 1787 and highlighted the weaknesses of the federal government under the Articles of Confederation.) Although the *Courier*'s editors intended it to express their view that the poor, uneducated, and unemployed were a threat to society, the author took a more sympathetic view and used *The Duke of Stockbridge* to explain that the rebellion had been a necessary response to hard times and an ineffectual post-Revolutionary government.

In 1900, two years after Edward's death, his cousin Francis Bellamy (better known as the author of the Pledge of Allegiance) published the novel in book form. However, this version was heavily edited. The original text eventually made its way into a book in 1962, when it was published by Joseph Schiffman.

## In the Archives

When you think of the Edward Bellamy Memorial Association's historical collections, what comes to mind? The obvious first thought is books and papers relating Edward Bellamy. Photos that have appeared in exhibits, newspaper articles, and local history books might also come to mind. However, there are also some other, lesser-known collections that deserve a turn in the spotlight. Below are descriptions of just a few.

- Anthony J. Stonina Collection: Consisting primarily of correspondence, this is a collection of papers from Stonina's three terms as Chicopee's mayor (1932-1933 and 1936-1939). Most notable are the materials concerning the construction of the Northeast Army Air Base (now know as Westover Air Reserve Base), but many other topics, ranging from public works projects to politics and the impact of the Great Depression, are covered as well.
- Richard H. Demers Collection: This collection contains the papers of another of Chicopee's mayors. Besides correspondence dating from his terms in office (1966-1969), there are also contemporaneous pages of Chicopee news from the *Holyoke Transcript-Telegram, Springfield Daily News*, and *Springfield Union*. Also included in the collection are papers from Demers's time as a state representative.
- Bellamy Local History Collection: This collection contains images, papers, books, and objects relating to Chicopee's history, including antique postcards and correspondence of the Taylor and Warner families (neighbors of the Bellamys). Also includes newspaper clippings that are organized by subject and date from the first half of the 20th century.
